From the Rabbi's Desk



Why Do We Do Jewish, and Who Gets To Benefit From It?

Someone recently asked me – “Rabbi, will you bury my non-Jewish spouse in the Jewish cemetery?”

What a great question to make me think about several issues at once!

First of all - the burial ground - Our Jewish community cemetery is owned by Temple Emanuel. The cemetery's policy is to allow burial of non-Jewish spouses. Several years ago, there was a brouhaha over the question of burial of non-Jews in the cemetery. The ensuing controversy was terribly divisive and damaging, and the scars remain in our community today. And.... it was entirely unnecessary. Jewish cemeteries require set aside, sanctified ground. Burial of non-Jews in that ground does **not** invalidate that sanctification.

Secondly - the burial itself- Can I officiate? There does not seem to be a clear halachic view of this. It's a spouse of a member of the synagogue. It's a person who raised a Jewish family, shlepped children to religious school and synagogue, was considered part of the Jewish community in life - but not in death?

So, I ask myself - is there anything that would cause me not to officiate? There would be no reference to, nor any rites of, other faiths. No other clergy of other faiths would lead with me.

Is the reading of Psalms, delivering a comforting eulogy, tearing *k'riya*, chanting *El Maleh Rachamim*, reciting the

Kaddish for a non-Jew inappropriate or counterintuitive? NO! These are Jewish rituals, for sure, but they are generic in the sense that they do not refer specifically only to Jews!

And here is the real question- Why do we do this Jewish stuff anyway? Do we practice Jewish ritual because it keeps us Jewish? Or because it helps us be more human? Isn't that the proclaimed purpose of Judaism - to be *Or LaGoyim* - a light to the nations? And if our rituals of burial and mourning and comfort work for us, as Jews, because they stir deeply human responses in us that “work” in our psyches, should we then not share our particular light/wisdom with others?

And this is nowhere as clear as it is with death - Whenever I give a speech on Jewish death and mourning customs to a hospice staff, they inevitably come over afterwards and say - “Oh Rabbi - this practice of *shiva* is so wise! I wish we Methodists had something like that.” Well, that's a particular “tribal” teaching of ours that works, and if it works, we ought to share it with the rest of humanity, because it'll work for them! It won't make them Jewish- it'll be a Jewish teaching/wisdom/practice helping them to access, or in this case, salve, our common humanity.

So, the short answer to the question is - yes, I will bury the non-Jewish spouse of this member of our congregation in our cemetery. But the questions that the question raises resound far beyond, and will, I hope, inform the thinking and evolution of our Judaism in the coming decades.

Kiddush Levana - Blessing of the New Moon

Your chance to dance under the new moon! Join us on Saturday evening, November 10 after havdala as we welcome the new moon in a short ceremony outdoors in the parking lot.

The Jewish Year and its Festivals are based upon the lunar calendar. The first of the month, Rosh Chodesh, is celebrated as a special day with its own liturgy. Rosh Chodesh is announced in synagogue on the Shabbat which precedes it, with a special prayer for life in the new month. The sight of the new moon which has reappeared is another occasion of celebrating this aspect of Creation, and our awareness of it, by expressing gratitude for the renewal of life, and hopefulness of the future.

The blessing of the new moon takes place out of doors, in sight of the moon, preferably with a minyan, between the third day and the fifteenth day of the lunar month. Looking forward to seeing you and your family at Saturday night minyan, December 15, at 5:45 pm. If you have a havdala candle or havdala set, bring it to increase the light of havdala. Mariv, havdala and moon dancing will conclude by 6:15.

Beth David Synagogue asks Members to Celebrate a Green Chanukah This Year

In time for Chanukah, the Jewish festival of lights, Beth David Synagogue in Greensboro is asking the Jewish community to add a modern-day environmental twist to their holiday celebrations by switching from regular incandescent and halogen light bulbs to energy-efficient, cost-effective compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs. This contemporary Chanukah celebration is part of a national climate change campaign, "A Light Among the Nations," launched in 2006 by the Coalition on the Environment and Jewish Life (COEJL) and the Jewish Council for Public Affairs (JCPA). The campaign encourages each household to change one light bulb each night of Chanukah.

From Iowa to Florida, New Hampshire to New Mexico, congregations and Jewish institutions numbering nearly 500 throughout the country and representing all denominations (Reform, Orthodox, Conservative, Reconstructionist, Renewal and Chabad) have participated in the COEJL campaign. Some examples include: the lighting of a public chanukiah with CFL bulbs at the Chicago Jewish Federation offices; engagement of local legislators and political conversations as part of a Hanukkah celebration in Minneapolis; and the installation of a CFL bulb in the *ner tamid* in Atlanta.

COEJL's campaign, also known as "How Many Jews Does it Take to Change a Light Bulb?," seeks to engage American Jewry in awareness, advocacy and concrete action to help stop global warming, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and conserve energy.

Judaism teaches us that while God created the world, humanity has been charged with tending to its care. "We are God's partners on this earth," says Rabbi Nina Beth Cardin, director of the BJEN. "We are the stewards who must protect, nurture and improve God's creation, both for our generation and the generations to come."

Without immediate action, global greenhouse gas emissions are projected to increase average Earth temperatures by 2.5 to 10.4 degrees Fahrenheit in this century, bringing rising seas, major weather and agricultural disruptions, environmental refugees, migrating diseases, and many uncertainties.

If every U.S. household changed just one light to a CFL bulb, the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions would be the same as taking 1.3 million cars off the road. CFLs use about 1/5 the energy of incandescent bulbs, save money on electricity costs, and last up to eight times longer than regular incandescent.

Beth David's campaign is inspiring bright ideas to enhance holiday celebrations in terms of awareness of the issue of energy conservation. The synagogue's gift shop is selling CFL lightbulbs as part of their Chanukah celebrations. Chanukah begins Tuesday evening, December 4 and continues for eight nights.
