This week, on Friday morning - Simchat Torah, we read the last section of the book of Devarim - Deuteronomy, and complete this year's reading of the Torah. We will then raise the Torah Scroll, so that you will actually be able to see the end of the scroll, and we will immediately start reading again, from the beginning of the Torah, from Bereshit, from the next scroll, We do this to show our love for the study of Torah, and so that we should not think that once we read it, we need not return to study and read it again. Indeed, we say of the words of the Torah - *Ki haym chayaynu v'orech yamenu* they are our life and the length of our days, and we will meditate on them night and day.

In our synagogue culture, it is considered a great honor to receive the aliya completing the Torah reading - called Chatan Torah - the groom of the Torah, and the aliya beginning the reading of the Torah - called Kallat Bereshit - the bride of the Bereshit - Genesis.

This years recipients of Chatan Torah and Kallat Bereshit were chosen because of their outstanding devotion and commitment and work, on behalf of the Jewish community of Greensboro, and our synagogue .

This year's recipients of these honors are:

From the President - Remarks from Kol Nidre



I stand here this evening as President of the Board of Trustees of Beth David representing those that have come before me and led the way for over sixty years. They laid the groundwork and to them I say thank you. And a special thank you to Josef who so boldly and courageously stood here last year.

I'm not sure how this happens, but it seems that as soon as one takes over the presidency of Beth David, the topic is immediately on the Kol Nidrei remarks. Why is this? What is this about? I've done a little research in this area. I am in good company...Right now at almost every conservative congregation in North America, first year presidents are about ninety days into their term talking about how they got here and what they plan to do for the next two years to change what their predecessors have done. And almost all 2nd year presidents are now thanking their congregations for the honor of serving and thanking their committee chairs and their vice presidents. In an attempt to change this, I've gotten some advice along the way from several very trusted friends and colleagues. They told me to speak from the heart, tell my story, quote Heschel, tell jokes, be funny, be brief, give the state of the synagogue, and appeal to people's emotions. Being the people-pleasing third child, I'm going to do all of the above!

Upon entering the sanctuary, for the first time, it is customary to say the Mah Tov prayer. The prayer consists of five biblical verses, four of them from psalms. I want to focus this evening on the first verse only....How lovely are your tents, O Jacob, your dwelling places, O Israel. This prayer actually is not recited on Kol Nidrei or Yom Kippur, however, we have it inscribed on our sanctuary plaques in the rear and I see it every time I enter for Shabbat. It is dedicated to those who gave generously for the construction of this sanctuary. And I found that it actually has a lot to do with my being here this evening. Rabbi Rami Shapiro, in his writings, suggests looking at this prayer from an ethical questioning rather than just a physical statement. Yes, because of a fairly recent remodel due to the generosity of one of our benefactors our tent is physically quite lovely.

I am going to back track and tell you the short story of my personal and ethical tent. I grew up here in Greensboro at Temple Emanuel, was confirmed at TE on Greene Street and Joe and I were married at the Temple. We raised our two daughters in St. Louis and moved back to GSO 12 years ago in 1995. Truthfully I had never set foot in Beth David.

In 1998, I went on the March of the Living, which is a two week trip, with high school students, the first week to the concentration camps in Poland followed by a week in Israel. As Edward Feld writes in his book, the *Spirit of Renewal*, "To experience the camps even as an observer is to be transformed; we are forced to face a different reality than the simple verities our own life of ease presents us with." After my return to GSO I knew that my Jewish journey had begun. I did not know what it would look like, but I knew I could no longer be a Jew in name only. Mah Tov... My Jewish house was not in order. In response to the extinction of 6 million Jews, and to insure the legacy of Judaism for my grandchildren and great-grandchildren, I must set the example. I must live Jewishly, hence my midlife tshuvah, return to Judaism. I began to put my tent in order. Some called it "the year Mom got Religion"- no, that was Lee Meyerhoff Henderl!

To start on this Jewish ladder, which seemed immense at the time, we bought a book about Shabbat and lit the Shabbat candles. I decided to attend Shabbat morning services at Beth David. I walked in and sat down. The rabbi came off the Bima to greet me and welcome me and I knew I had found a home. Suffice it to say that although I am not a native of Beth David, I had found a sanctuary in this sanctuary.

I'm Doing a Mitzvah

Over the High Holydays, we talked about the word - *Mitzvah*.

Mitzvah, which means "commandment" in Hebrew, has come to represent so much more than its simple meaning. During our Yom Kippur afternoon discussion, people said that *Mitzvah* for them meant- Jewish act, obligation, commitment, good deed, act of love, responsibility. The source of authority for doing a *Mitzvah* ranged from - the Torah, getting closer to God, my mother, tradition, to wanting to insure my own immortality, and more.

In truth, it's how we understand *Mitzvah* that defines us as Conservative Jews. Painted broadly, the Orthodox practice *Mitzvah* because God said so. The Reform practice *Mitzvah* only if each person decides that's its meaningful to him or her. We are somewhere in the middle - We accept the idea of commitment to Jewish acts, but our understanding of the authority driving us to perform those acts is at best varied; at worst, hazy.

The new Chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary, Arnold Eisen, has asked Conservative congregations around the country to consider the meaning of *Mitzvah* for us and our families and our congregation. Last year, I devoted my Friday night *Divray Torah* to Hebrew - Each week, we "unpacked" a Hebrew root word, usually from the *Parsha*, and explored how it developed into phrases and usages within our tradition.

This year, I will focus my Friday night teaching on the idea of *Mitzvah* - specifically a different *Mitzvah* each Friday night. I've sketched out a calendar for the next few months- some weeks the *Mitzvah* will be taken from that week's *Parsha*, on other weeks, nuances in the Jewish calendar, or some connected to historical or current events.

The first four weeks will be:

Parshat Bereshit 10/4 - the *mitzvah* of "Be fruitful and multiply"

Parshat Noach 10/12 - The *mitzvah* of establishing the Jewish calendar

Parshat Lech Lecha 10/19 - the *mitzvah* of *brit mila*

Parshat VaYera 10/26 - the *mitzvah* of *hachanast orchim* - welcoming guests

I hope that you'll join me this year in our exploration of the Jewish concept of *Mitzvah*, and as we learn about the *Mitzvot* of our tradition and grapple with the meaning of *Mitzvah* for us as Conservative Jews in the 21st century.

Dairy Kugel

1. 1 lb noodles - cook according to the package.
2. Mix together and add to drained noodles:
 - 1 pint sour cream
 - 1 1/2 lbs. cottage cheese
 - 4 eggs
 - 4 - 8 T sugar
 - cinnamon to taste
3. Add raisins and 2 apples (peeled, cored, "chunked").
4. After putting some in a bowl for "uncooked kugel," place the rest in a greased 9" x 13" pan and dot top with margarine or butter (about 2 T).
5. Bake in preheated oven at 350 for 30 - 45 minutes.

From the President (continued)

How lovely are your tents, O Jacob, your dwelling places, O Israel? Mah Tov? During the past 9 years I have taken many small steps of Jewish learning, spirituality, ritual, and leadership. And I am not alone. I like to say we have finders and founders here at Beth David.

Lucky for me Beth David was here. Like myself, most of us take for granted that when we have our religious aha moments, or when a loved one dies or when our child has a B'nai Mitzvah, or when our baby is born, or our daughter gets engaged, Beth David will be here for us. Our founders made sure that the building was built andhere we are 60 years later.

There is much we can do to insure the future of our tent for our children and grandchildren just as those founders on the plaque at the back wall did for us. It is our turn now.

Our doors are open every day for minyan, don't wait - come and join us, daven with us, learn with us. We have classes in Hebrew and English, Torah study, Talmud, women's bible study, Iron Chef cooking, and visiting scholars like Dr. Tamar Rudavsky. The list continues. We've got a lot going on at Beth David. Much has happened since June 1 when our new Board took office; we have hired Mark Goodfriend as our new interim director of Religious Education and Congregational Programming. And starting next week, Wendy Rothstein will begin as our Executive director. Please come by and meet the staff that works diligently to take care of all of our needs. We've applied for and received grant money from the BJH, Blumenthal Foundation for senior services, which has helped us provide more programming for our Chazak and vatikim groups.

If you have ideas for programs, speakers, support groups, or if you have talents you'd like to share, please feel free to email me.

So at this time of reflection on Yom Kippur I would like you all to think about your tent and our collective tent. Is the tent in order? What can you do this year? Light the Shabbat candles? Come to a class and learn how to do Shabbat at home?

Your Board of Trustees is working diligently to get our financial tent in order also. As you know, we have raised dues and we thank you for your positive response. We are keeping close tabs on the budget and doing financial evaluations to end with a balanced budget. Many of you have answered our pleas to help reduce our prior deficit. To all of you we say Thank you. To those of you on reduced and limited incomes, paying what you can, we also say thank you. How lovely are your tents, O Jacob, your dwelling places, O Israel.

Before I conclude I would like to take a moment to thank the special people who have made it possible for me to be here. My parents, Doris and Stanley Tanger. Thank you for teaching me the importance of being grateful for all that we have and the valuable lesson of giving back to a community that has given so much to us. And most importantly to my husband Joe for encouraging me and joining me on the journey.

And to our children, thank you for your patience and understanding.

The FIRST leadership lesson I learned is that leaders must lead the way. Joe and I, on behalf of our entire family, have made a contribution to the Beth David operating endowment to ensure the future of our synagogue for generations to come in honor of our grand daughter Annabelle Syd Pantzer. We hope you will join us and increase the endowment for the future of Beth David.

Novelist William Styron - who brought *Sophie's Choice*, a tragic decision with haunting consequences, into the English Lexicon

Milton Friedman - the Nobel Prize winning economist

Bo Schembechler - Legendary Michigan football coach

Skip Prosser - Wake Forest Basketball coach

James Brown - who taught us to "feel good"

Jane Wyatt - actress best known from *Father Knows Best*

Red Auerbach - Celtics coach

Ed Bradley - Longtime CBS correspondent, on *60 Minutes* for 25 years

Robert Altman - director of *M * A * S * H*

Emmett Kelly, Jr. - the clown

Dr. Jeanne Kirkpatrick - The first woman to be the US's permanent envoy to the UN, considered herself a lifelong Democrat even though she became a Republican in 1985.

Joseph Barbera - Creator of popular cartoons such as *Quick Draw McGraw* and *Top Cat*, partner of William Hanna

Yvonne De Carlo - Lily Munster

Art Buchwald - one of America's most loved humorous columnist

Bob Carroll, Jr. - Co-creator of *I Love Lucy*

Molly Ivins (writer) - Many years of great columns and several books She wrote: "We are the people who run this country. We are the deciders."

Johnny Hart (cartoonist) - Creator of *B.C.* and *The Wizard of Id*

Don Ho - entertainer

Kitty Carlisle Hart - regular on *To Tell the Truth*,

David Halberstam (writer) - Won a Pulitzer Prize in the '60s for reporting on the Vietnam War

Boris Yeltsin - former Russian President

Warren Avis - Started the Avis Rent-a-Car Company in 1946

Mstislav Rostropovich (cellist/conductor) - he was a professional cellist for over 60 years, gave famous concerts in Berlin after the wall came down, had his Russian citizenship stripped and later restored, and directed the National Symphony in Washington for 17 years.

Gordon Scott (actor) -- Played Tarzan in the '50s

Walter Schirra, Jr. - astronaut/fifth American in space, participated in Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo NASA spaceflight programs.

Kurt Waldheim - Led the U. N. from 1972 to 1982, later served as Austrian president, was a Nazi soldier during WWII

Liz Claiborne - Designer of clothes for women

Joel Siegel - Film critic for ABC, co-founder of Gilda's Club

Beverly Sills - Soprano with the New York City Opera and later the Met who went on to manage opera companies

Lady Bird Johnson - former First Lady, highway beautifier

Tom Snyder - Talk show host

Merv Griffin - Talk show host and singer who also created game shows like *Jeopardy!* and *Wheel of Fortune*.

Brooke Astor - philanthropist - Donated substantial sums to the New York Public Library, Carnegie Hall, the Museum of Natural History, Central Park, the Bronx Zoo, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the Apollo Theater.

Leona Helmsley - Difficult person who managed many hotels for her husband Harry, nicknamed "The Queen of Mean," willed \$12 million to her dog, once said "Only the little people pay taxes," she served time for tax evasion.

Grace Paley - poet and anti-war activist.

Madeleine L'Engle - writer who won the Newbery Award for *A Wrinkle in Time*,

Gerald Ford - who taught us that sometimes forgiveness trumps revenge

Teddy Kollek - the long time mayor of Jerusalem who was a bridge between the various religious and ethnic communities in a very divided city.

Arthur Schlesinger - American historian and social critic

Rabbi Louis Jacobs - an outstanding Jewish theologian, preacher, and teacher.

Kurt Vonnegut - So it goes.

Jerry Falwell - who transformed American politics by melding it with Conservative Christian evangelism

Ingmar Bergman - master filmmaker.

Richard A. Jewell - transformed from heroic security guard to Olympic bombing suspect and back again

Luciano Pavarotti - simply the best-known tenor of all time.

Liviu Librescu - one of 32 victims killed by a student gunman at Virginia Tech. The engineering professor, a Holocaust survivor who had moved to Israel, was shot while blocking the doorway to his classroom. He prevented the South Korean gunman from entering and enabled all but one of his students to escape through the window.

Jean-Marie Lustiger - a Jewish-born convert to Catholicism who became a top Vatican figure, died. A former archbishop of Paris, he was the son of Polish Jewish refugees but converted while hiding out in Catholic boarding schools during World War II. He said he always considered himself a Jew. Mourners recited Kaddish for him during his funeral at Paris' Notre Dame Cathedral.

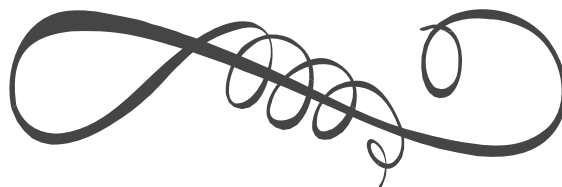
